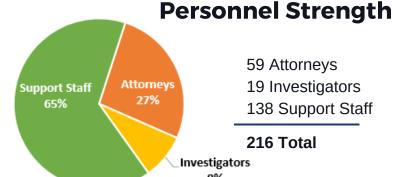

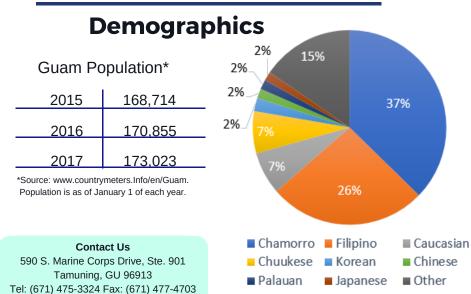

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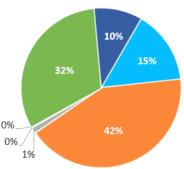

### Rate of Return Highlights

#### **Public Assistance Recoveries**

The Public Assistance Recoveries are from the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) amounts from Child Support, which provides families with financial assistance and recovers money for the government from TANF recipients with child support cases.

#### **Child Support Collections**

Since the enactment of the 2010 Electronic Funds Transfer Law, majority of child support collections are received by employers. In FY2017, 64% of total child support payments were received through Employer Withholdings, and 14% was received through local and federal Tax Withholding.

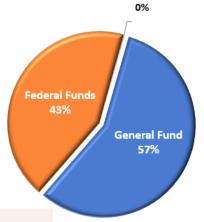

# Significant Changes to Revenue

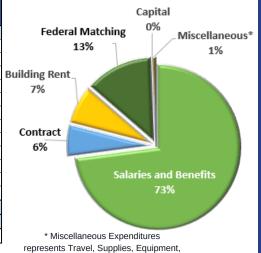

# **Significant Changes to Expenditures**

- Special Revenue Expenditures were comprised mainly of CICC awards as the OAG has greatly expanded its award process to victims of crime.
- Capital expenditures were not budgeted for in FY2017 as renovations and leasehold improvements were completed during FY2016.
- Equipment expenditures decreased by \$350,907 as most equipment for the OAG was procured in FY2015 and FY2016.

Expense Reimbursement, Telephone, and Drug Testing

 Salaries and Benefits increased by \$656,172 due to the recruitment of eleven additional staff members and organic growth.

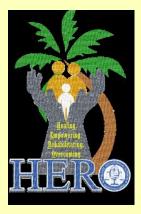

# Accomplishments



The H.E.R.O./Restorative
Justice Juvenile Reform
Program began in full swing,
reducing the number of
juvenile charges. The White
Collar Crime Unit actively
pursued public corruption and
tax fraud cases. The Criminal
Injuries Compensation
Program initiated regular
hearings.

FY2017 was a period of increased civil litigation on behalf of the government of Guam. The OAG:

- Sued the United States government under CERCLA to recover funds associated with closure of the Ordot Dump and construction of Layon Landfill
- Defended Chamorro Land Trust against Fair Housing Act suit initiated by U.S. Department of Justice
- Defended indigenous rights vote in Plebiscite Voting Case
- Dismissed the 1991 DOC Consent Decree Case with establishment of correctional medical and dental health care for inmates and detainees under NCCHC standards

FY 2017 was challenging as it represented the period of implementation of numerous programs and projects for overall improvement of the criminal justice arm of the OAG. The Administration Division fully implemented the following infrastructure:

- Human Resources Section
- Finance Section
- Information Technology Section
- Federal Programs Section

In January 2017, the OAG partnered with the National Association of Attorneys General Training and Research Institute (NAGTRI) to provide an extensive and detailed three day training for law enforcement and legal teams from Guam and Saipan.



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# Future Challenges and Economic Outlook

The OAG seeks to accomplish the following with a \$1.4M budget reduction:



- Implementation of an Automated Victim Information Notification System (AVINS)
- Expand the H.E.R.O./Restorative Justice Program to include curriculum in the Department of Education schools
- Increase federal grant capacity and diversify OAG funding streams
- Establish a Collections Unit to pursue revenues and victim restitution
- Attain enactment of legislation to strengthen the powers and duties of the OAG
